Covid-19 Testing

79% likely to go for voluntary Covid-19 testing 8% know someone who has tested positive for the virus



Stigma - Recovered patients

23% would NOT visit recovered patients



41% would NOT allow own children to pay with recovered patients' children



Mental Health - Substance **Abuse**

14% used more of a substance (i.e tobacco, coffee, tea, others) to feel normal.



9% Consumed four or more drinks of alcohol (glasses of wine, bottles of beer, measures of spirits) in a sitting



Barriers to Covid-19 testing

23% test discomfort 14% mandatory quarantine 9% fear stigmatization



Stigma - Family of Deceased

37% would NOT attend the funeral of a close friend even if the number of mourners is less than 15 and social distancing is assured.




Mental Health - Stress

Study Background



Introduction





Stigmatization

Initially, when the first coronavirus cases were reported in the country, stigma was directed towards people of Chinese origin, recent travelers, healthcare workers and emergency responders. As the disease continued to spread amongst Kenyans, the stigmatization has spread towards people who have recovered from the disease, those that have been released from quarantine and their family members. The stigmatization is worse for those whose close family members have died from the virus.

Psychological Stress

Effects of Covid-19, such as loss of jobs and isolation have heightened stress levels among many people, worsening their mental and health well-being. There has been reports of increased domestic violence and also people live fearfully due to the rise in insecurity in their neighborhoods during the pandemic period.

It is upon the above background that TIFA conducted a study to examine stigma and mental health implications of COVID-19 to Kenyan Citizens.

Study objectives & methodology





Objectives

The survey sought to access the following;

- ☐ Stigma towards Covid-19 testing
- Stigmatization of recovered patients
- Stigmatization toward bereaved families
- Psychological distress arising from Covid-19

Methodology

Geographical scope of study	National representative sample by age/gender/regions
Target respondents	Adults (18+ years)
Sample size	843 respondents (Male = 411, Female = 432)
Margin-of-error	+/- 4.1% for the total sample. (Note: Sub-sample results have higher errormargins)

Corona Virus Anxiety




Expected Future Impact of the Virus (by total)



Almost half (46%) of the respondents are pessimistic about the future of the virus crisis as they feel the worst is yet to come whilst slightly over about one-third feel that the worst has passed and the situation will being to improve.



Expected future impact of virus: by Total





Anxiety Level About Contracting the Virus (by total & gender)



- □ About two-thirds of all respondents are "very worried" about contracting the Covid-19 virus.
- Women respondents are more anxious about this.

Anxiety-Level About Contracting the Corona Virus By total Not worried at all, 16% Only a little worried, 12% Very worried, 65%



Voluntary Testing




Voluntary testing for Covid-19 (By Total)



☐ Majority of the respondents are 'highly likely' to go for voluntary testing for the virus.


Q: How likely are you to go for CORONA test if it were offered free of charge in your neighborhood?

Covid-19 voluntary testing intentions (by gender, age & region)



- □ Gender: there are no significant differences in the propensity to test for both male and female respondents.
- □ Age: The older respondents are more likely to test for Covid-19 and this could be attributed to the fact that they are a higher risk.
- □ **Region:** The regions with a slightly lower propensity to go for voluntary test include Nairobi and Rift Valley.

Likelihood voluntary testing: by total, gender, age, region (% who say they are highly likely to test)




Barriers for voluntary testing (by intention to test)



- □ Those unlikely to test: they have concerns about the discomfort of the test, fear of being mandatory quarantine and lack of trust in the testing kits. A significant proportion fear the stigmatization from family and neighbors should they be found to have Covid-19
- □ Those likely to test: in spite their intention to go for voluntary testing, they fear that the test may be painful, mandatory quarantine and stigma from neighbors.


Action after testing positive for Covid-19 (by total)



The respondents were read out to a list of actions that could be taken if they test positive for Covid-19.

- □ **Self isolation** is the most commonly mentioned action by the respondents.
- □ Status Disclosure: the level of disclosure about personal status to family, friends and relatives is below 50%
- □ Contacts disclosure: majority would not share the contacts of those they interacted with to Ministry of Health for tracing.

Action after testing positive for Covid-19 (by region)




The actions to be taken by respondents across the regions is similar. However Central Region respondents have a higher propensity to share the test results with immediate family, coast region is more likely to inform friends and relatives.

Actions to be taken if test positive - prompted (by total)

■ Isolate myself for the required 14 days


- Inform immediate family members that you have the virus
- Provide contacts of those you interacted with recently to Min of Health Inform friends and relatives that you have the virus
- Inform pastor or religious leaders and ask for prayers

☐ The is a worrying proportion of Kenyans who feel that Covid-19 leads to definite death or feel that there is not hope of recovery






Know someone who has tested positive for Covid-19

% who know friend/relative/neighbor who has tested positive of Corona






Stigma Levels for recovered patients (by total)



One quarter of the sample would stigmatize recovered patients. Over three quarters of the sample would visit a recovered patient. There is higher stigma when it comes to their children interacting with those of recovered patients.






Stigma Levels for recovered patients (by total, gender, age, region)



- □ Gender: Fewer females respondents would allow their children to play with other children from recovered patients
- □ Age: The older folk (aged 45+) show more stigma towards interacting with recovered patients.
- □ **Region**: Greatest stigma around children is in Rift Valley.


% who agree with statement



Funeral attendance of a close friend died from Covid-19



- □ About one two thirds would attend funeral even if the number of mourners/attendees is not more that 15
- ☐ Stigma is in Eastern, Rift and Nyanza regions

Incidence of psychological stress (by total)



□ The psychological strain is amongst Kenyans is depicted in the feeling irritable/depressed/homeless (23%) and being nervous or on edge (22%). This followed by having trouble sleeping at 19%




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Experienced trouble with sleep (by total, gender, age, region)



□ Those who have trouble sleeping are more likely to be aged 35-44 years and living in Nairobi and Rift Valley.



☐ Those who are feeling irritable, depressed, or hopeless are more likely to be aged 35-44 years and living in Rift Valley.




Q: Looking back at the last 2weeks, have you - Feeling irritable, depressed, or hopeless

☐ Those who are feeling nervous, anxious, or on edge are more likely to be aged 35-44 years.



☐ Those who have consumed four or more drinks of alcohol are more likely to be males and living in Nairobi.





☐ Those who have used a substance more than usual are aged 34-44 years and living in Central and Nairobi regions.


